another and helps the reader understand the minds and emotions of each soldier a part of the mission.

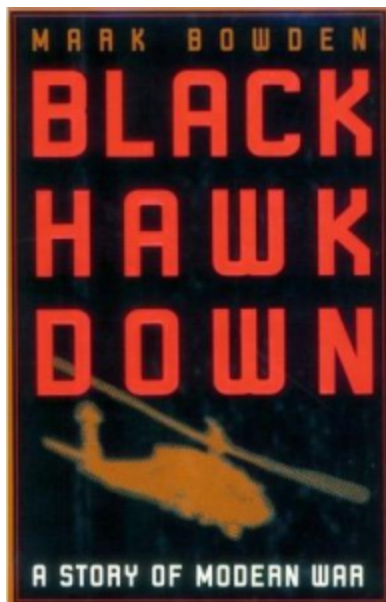
